# JCA COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

## INTRODUCTION

The Jamaica Cricket Association (JCA) took the unprecedented move recently to establish a Communication Committee. The first committee members are Reverend Dr. Devon Dick – Chairman, Paul Campbell – President, JCA, Randolph “Randy” Nelson – Spokesperson, Ian Beckford, Courtney Wallace, Keith Campbell, O’neil Cruickshank, Diahann Whitelocke and Trudy Williams.

The life of the committee will run simultaneously with that of the current board and will therefore expire on September 30, 2010.

The aim of the JCA’s Communication Committee is to deliver information to all stakeholders accurately, timely and regularly.

## COMMUNICATION POLICY

### Objectives

In keeping with the aims of the committee, the following objectives will be pursued:

To increase the level of communication with all stakeholders in order to achieve a greater level of appreciation of the work of the JCA.

To deliver newsletters, update website, arrange news conferences, edit and approve all press releases and advertisements, edit speeches; Guidelines for interacting with the media during crisis/emergency.

### Strategies

The committee’s objectives will be achieved by utilizing the following strategies:

The most cost effective forms of communication on behalf of the JCA including but not limited to Media – print, electronic – television, radio, internet, outdoor, new media.

### List of Stakeholders

The list of stakeholders to include, but not limited to, players, board and executive members, spectators, workers, media, spon-

sors, various committee members, associations, competitors, clubs, schools at all levels.

### Communication Scope

Communication refers to both internal and external communication with the understanding that internal communication will be handled as a staff matter; therefore the committee would not be responsible for same. The committee will, therefore, drive external communication emanating from the JCA.

### Publications

Magazines, Reports – annual and otherwise, newspaper features and supplements and newsletters can be effective.

### Players

No player should represent the country without first going through a period of theoretical orientation which covers topics such as the history of the game and its importance to the various stakeholders.

### Spectators

Develop a cricket fan club by creating definite lines of communication and which is separate from the public communication channel, e.g. using an E-mail bank to maintain constant contact with a select group of individuals and/or institution.

### Relationship with Partners/Sponsors

There can be greater mileage from events sponsored by partners and regular information needs to flow to them even in competitions they are not directly involved. In addition, events can be executed in a more professional manner.

### Hiring a Communications Officer

A paid person needs to get the information to the committee for action and also to keep the constituency informed and excited.

## THE TEAM

### Diyal Fernando, Chief Executive Officer

A Chartered Management Accountant by training, Diyal Fernando has adopted the "land of wood and water" as his home after living close to 21 years in Jamaica having been employed by the ICD Group of Companies in 1990 as a Management Trainee.

He spent 15 years with ICD in various capacities primarily in the sphere of accounting and financial management in the group subsidiaries of Homelectrix Limited, Butterkist Limited, West Indies Home Contractors Limited (WIHCON), Serge Island Dairies Limited, P.A. Benjamin Manufacturing Company Limited, WIHCON Properties Limited and Prime Agency Limited serving as a Director in the latter four companies. He also served two years at the Head Office between 2001 and 2002 as General Manager Finance for ICD and WIHCON.

In 2005 he joined Rose Hall Developments Limited as Finance Director and spearheaded the negotiation of financing from the Bank of Nova Scotia for the establishment of the company's water reclamation plant established in Rose Hall, St. James in 2007. He negotiated other commercial arrangements related to the company's real estate activities and project developments.

He also served as a Director of the Montego Bay Chamber of Commerce and Industry in 2007 and 2008, serving as the Treasurer in the latter year.

Diyal is Sri Lankan by birth and spent his high school years in Sydney, Australia, where he acquired a love for the game of cricket. He has actively followed the sport most of his life including having witnessed the World Cup Finals at Lords in 1999 and several matches of the World Cup in the West Indies in 2007, including the Finals at Kensington Oval.

He joins the JCA at a time of serious economic and environmental challenge but brings with him a passion and commitment for excellence and the drive to execute the vision and mission of the Jamaica Cricket Association for the development and growth of the game of cricket in Jamaica and ultimately, the West Indies.

He is married to Kithmini, enjoys swimming, playing tennis and pool in his spare time and has an interest in thoroughbred racing.

### Courtney Francis, Cricket Operations Officer

A former national cricketer at the under-19 level, Courtney has also played cricket for St. Catherine Cricket Club as well as at a professional level. Currently a certified level 2 cricket coach, match referee and umpire at the JCUA level, Courtney worked as Assistant Cricket Operations Manager for two years. He was recently appointed Cricket Operations Officer of the JCA.

He is married to Nicole and is the father of two daughters.

### Jimmy Adams, Technical Director

In the first half of his career, Jimmy Adams generated phenomenal statistics. Born in Jamaica to a pair of doctors, he grew up as a clinical left-hander, willowy and strong off his legs, whose unblinking concentration shone out through a string of big hundreds and not-outs. A sharp catcher in the gully, his left-arm tweakers remain a handy sideline. At the start of 2006 he was the manager of the West Indies Under-19 cricket team. In 2008, Adams succeeded Barry Richards as president of the Federation of International Cricketers' Associations. Later in the year, he was appointed Technical Director of Jamaica Cricket Association (JCA).

### Mitzie Pratt – Marketing Operations Officer

Mitzie possess a unique mix of experience, knowledge, skills and creative abilities which will enhance and support the JCA. She has more than 12 years experience in Marketing and Management and ten years in Public Relations and Promotions working in Jamaica and the United States. Mitzie returned to Jamaica in 2003 after living for more than 20 years in the United States. She worked with the Hilton Kingston Hotel over two years in 2003 as Sales Manager and in 2004 was promoted to Sales & Public Relations Manager. She joined Toyota Jamaica Limited in 2007 until recently as a Sales Consultant when she joined the Jamaica Cricket Association team as Marketing Officer. Her other interests are in Drama and the Performing Arts having appeared in many features films and theatre productions both in the US and Jamaica.

# RED STRIPE 20/20 CHAMPIONSHIP

The Red Stripe 20/20 Championship was the Jamaica Cricket Association’s response to the need of the Jamaican public to experience the aura of the new format of cricket that has energized cricket fans across the world with its frenetic pace and shortened time span.

### Teams

At the end of 23 matches St. Catherine CC (Saints) emerged champions of the inaugural JCA Red Stripe 20/20 Championship and in the process earned the ‘lion’ share of the over \$3M in prize monies on offer to the teams. Runners –up

was the Manchester Lions, the semi-professional league champions. The four teams making it through to the semi-finals also included Melbourne (Kangaroos) and the unseeded Hanover (Dolphins).

24 teams took part in the competition including the Jamaica Masters team involving past national (senior and junior) players and the 2008 SDC 20/20 champions South Star (of Manchester). The teams that took part in the competition with their monikers were:

### Format

The competition was played on a knockout basis over a 4-week period, starting on September 12, 2009 with the final on Sunday October 4, 2009. Five venues were selected across the country to host matches namely, Up Park Camp, Kaiser Sports Club Grounds, Chedwin Park, ALPART Sports Club and Sabina Park. Except for the final, when only one match was played, the start times for the matches were 10:00 a.m. (1st match) and 2:00 p.m. (2nd match).

8 teams, inclusive of the invited ones were seeded and these teams entered the competition in the 2nd round. The other seeded teams were those that finished 1-6 in the 2008 Semi-professional league, the JCA’s top tier 2-day competition. Thus, St. Catherine CC, Trelawny, Melbourne, Manchester, Kingston and St. Elizabeth were joined by South Star and the Jamaica Masters as the seeded teams.

### Performances

A total of 23 matches were played over the 4 weeks. For the first two rounds the average score was 131 runs for 7wkts off 18 overs. From the quarter-finals through to the finals, the average score was 122 runs for 8 wkts off 19 overs. The analysis would indicate that the matches got more competitive as the tournament went on, and for those who watched the games throughout that was the reality. Man-

chester's score of 185-7 against Kensington in the quarter-final was the tournament's highest team score, while the lowest total was also attained in the quarter-finals when Hanover dismissed Kingston & St. Andrew for 57 in chase of 117. There were no individual scores over 100 but thirteen half-centuries were scored- all by different players. The highest individual score was 81 made by Horace Miller of Kensington. Only one bowler, Krishmar Santokie of Manchester, took more than 5 wickets in an innings- and he did it twice! His and the tournament's best bowling were 5-15 off 3.5 overs.

### Sponsor and Fan Support and Fan Promotion

Red Stripe support for the Championship, apart from sponsoring to the tune of \$10M, came in the form of 2 road shows and game day giveaways. Road shows were held on Friday September 11 in St. Ann and Friday September 25 in St. Elizabeth. These shows were used to heighten spectator interest in the brand – Red Stripe – and as a 'teaser' to the games the following day. At the matches, Red Stripe through their event management contractor, Main Events, staged half-time giveaway activities

where patrons were invited to take part in cricket-related skill activities and win Red Stripe products. This culminated in the JCA putting up \$50,000.00 for a mini cricket tournament over the weekend of the semi-finals/finals. This particular event had tremendous support and the organizers had to shut down registration earlier than originally planned.

Associate sponsors for the Red Stripe 20/20 were Jamaica Observer, the JCA's official Media Partner, KLAS Sports Radio, Nature's Mist, the JCA's official Water partner, JUTC – the official Transport provider for the JCA and Virginia Dear, providers of Hi-Lyte drink mix – the rehydration fluid.

Throughout the tournament, the spectator support increased as the rounds went closer to the final. Some venues such as Kaiser Sports Club in Discovery Bay, St. Ann and ALPART Sports Club in Nain, St. Elizabeth drew as large a crowd as has been seen in local cricket for a long time. The finals at Sabina Park also had reasonable support. What was evident in all the cases where the crowd support was above what has been the norm is the way the players seem to have responded in performances. The most entertaining games were reserved for the occasions when the atmosphere was conducive to competitive cricket, such as was present for the quarter-finals, semi-finals and final.

The 1st year of the Red Stripe 20/20 was by all accounts a success. The competition was blessed with very good weather for cricket. There was a very heavy downpour on the morning of the finals but because of the composition (sand base) of the Sabina Park outfield, the game was played to its fullest, even with an interruption for (more) rain. The marketing and promotion of the event was without doubt the most intense of any JCA production in recent years, and this contributed immensely to the reach of the competition. Live broadcast of the final on KLAS Sports radio, preamble by weekly game day 'spot' round-up,

# JAMAICA CRICKET ASSOCIATION STRATEGIC PLANNING RETREAT

The Board of Directors held a Strategic Planning Retreat on August 15 and 16 to discuss the way forward for the period 2010 to 2012.

The President in his opening remarks outlined his vision for the Organization, the recent history surrounding the decline of West Indies cricket and his priorities for the re-vitalization of cricket throughout Jamaica as a catalyst for change throughout the region.

The Vision of the JCA is to "To establish cricket as the preferred sport in Jamaica and the Jamaican team as the dominant force in West Indies Cricket"

It's Mission is to "Display leadership excellence in the development and promotion of the game of cricket in Jamaica by engaging all our stakeholders to the benefit and enjoyment of our people."

The Directors agreed on key **KEY STRATEGIC INITIATIVES** to be implemented over the next three years:

(i) **Quality Players**

- Ensure that Coaching and Development Programmes are of international standards producing a quality cricketing professional
- Establish a Jamaica Centre for Cricket Excellence (JCCE)
- Strength cricket programmes in clubs, parishes, schools and at the community level by partnering with the SDC, INSPORT and ISSA.

(ii) **Financial Sustainability**

- Initiate marketing strategy aimed at attracting sponsors for all Tournaments
- Establish Cricket Development Foundation to attract long-term funding
- Install lights at Sabina Park by 2012

(iii) **Cricket Administration and Organization**

- Build a Professional Administrative Organization able to deliver world- class cricketing events and foster the development of the sport
- Ensure effective management to ensure that programmes are delivered efficiently and cost effectively
- Generate support for the game from members of the Jamaican Diaspora
